School of Social Work Alumni Surveys 2010-2011

Distributed twice a year in May and October, alumni surveys enable us to hear directly from our students. Our BSW graduates "complete the loop" by letting us know how well their BSW education has served them in becoming a successful social work practitioner. While survey questions were not specifically geared to address the latest EPAS standards, at least 16 of the 31 survey questions (question numbers 9 - 24) are clearly connected to the practice behaviors outline in the present self-study. The 16 evaluation questions are linked to core competencies as follows:

Validity and reliability are lacking with a small sample size and a limited time frame. Nevertheless, the data viewed as a whole, suggest the SSW is doing a fine job of teaching core competencies to our students. Especially encouraging, are the positive responses from our alumni, who have know had an opportunity to *apply* their knowledge, skills, and competencies in the *real* world of professional social work. Perhaps our curriculum is just what the doctor ordered.
